Maggie Dietz, author of *That Kind of Happy* (University of Chicago Press, 2016,) and *Perennial Fall* (University of Chicago, 2006), which won the 2007 Jane Kenyon Award for Outstanding Book of Poetry and a Wisconsin Library Association Literary Award for Outstanding Achievement. She was director of the



Favorite Poem Project. With Robert Pinsky, she co-edited three anthologies related to the project. Her awards include the Grolier Poetry Prize, the George Bennett Fellowship, fellowships from the Fine Arts Work Center, and the NH State Council on the Arts. Dietz's poems have appeared in literary journals such as Poetry, Ploughshares, The Threepenny Review, Agni, Harvard Review and Salmagundi. Dietz taught in the Creative Writing Program at Boston University and was assistant poetry editor of online magazine, Slate. She is Associate Professor of English at UMass, Lowell.
